"The Yap Island Market is a vital source of income for my family,"

says Monica. "Last year, I brought in around \$8,000, which makes a big difference. But the real reward is seeing happy customers and knowing I contribute to fresh, local food." Mark echoes this sentiment, highlighting the market's social aspects: "I also make around \$500 every month. But it's more than just income. It's a chance to connect with friends, neighbors, and visitors. I enjoy helping other farmers, and there's always something new to learn about running a successful



agro-business."

**Building Capacity for All**: Yap CRE's impact extends beyond individual farmers by connecting more farmers with the market, increasing the variety and availability of local produce, and strengthening the market's appeal to the community.
